but deliver us from evil.**

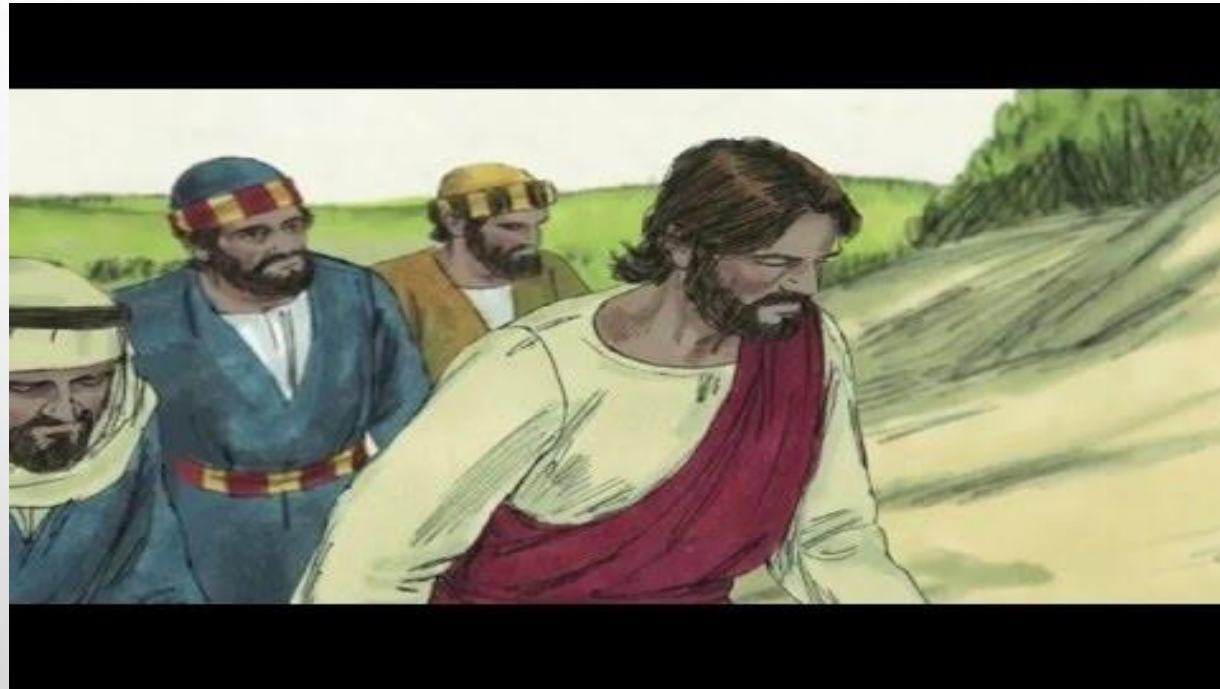

St. Katherine Drexel was born in Philadelphia in 1858. She took an avid interest in the well being of black and native Americans. She began by donating money but soon realized more was necessary.

She founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament for Black and Native American peoples, dedicating her life and fortune of \$20 million to this work.

She opened the first mission school for Indians and many others for blacks in the south. She founded Xavier University in New Orleans.

Katherine became only the 2nd recognized American born saint in 2000.

St. Casimir
March 4



St. Casimir was born on October 3, 1458. He was known for living a life of great piety, good works and virtue. Upon contracting tuberculosis, he died at the age of 25 on March 4, 1483. Shortly after his death, people came in large numbers to visit his tomb and pray for intercession with God. His body was associated with numerous miracles and blessings from God.
